### **Further Information**

- Please contact the MRI Department if you weight more than 21 stone, you may require an alterative examination.
- If you are on medication from your doctor, please continue to take as normal.
- Please arrive 15 minute before your appointment time, so we can prepare you for your scan.
- Please inform a Radiographer is there is any chance you are pregnant.
- If you have any metallic or electronic implants, please inform the MRI secretaries prior to your scan. The list includes but is not limited to: cardiac pacemaker, artificial heart valve, spinal cord stimulator, vagal nerve stimulator, aneurysm clip (metal clip inserted in a blood vessel in the brain), reprogrammable shunt.
- If you have previously had metal fragments in the eye, head or body (if you suspect that a metal fragment may have entered your eye, particularly if you have ever worked with metal grinding equipment), please contact us for advice.



# **MRI SMALL BOWEL**



#### Introduction

You have been advised by your doctor to get a magnetic resonance imaging scan (MRI). This leaflet will explain what the scan involves and how to prepare for your scan. If you have any other queries please contact the listed phone number or ask one of the MRI Radiographers.

### What is an MRI Scan?

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) uses a strong magnetic field, to produce high quality images of the body. This examination will look at the small intestine (bowel). It may help your doctor diagnose inflammation, bleeding, obstructions and other problems.

There are no known health risks or side affects associated with MRI. Magnetic resonance imaging does not use radiation, unlike x-ray.

Because of the strong magnetic field used to produce the MR image, some people are not suitable for scanning by MRI. It is important for us to know if you have metallic/ electrical implants or have had certain operations. Implants and devices must be reviewed prior to your MRI scan.

#### **Preparation for your MRI Scan**

The Radiographer will provide you with an MRI Safety Questionnaire to complete, prior to your examination. One of the MRI Radiographers will go through the Questionnaire with you prior to the scan. You will be given an opportunity to ask any questions you may have.

You may be required to get changed into a hospital gown prior to your examination. You will also be required to remove any jewellery or metallic objects, as you will not be permitted to take them into the scan room with you. Belongings can be placed in a locker, left with a companion or the Radiographer can look after them for you.

You will be required to drink a solution (Klean-Prep) for 40minutes—1 hour, prior to your scan, to clearly demonstrate the walls of your small bowel. You will also require an injection of contrast medium for this scan. The Radiology Nurse will insert a small tube (cannula) into a vein in your arm. This will permit the Radiographer to administer contrast media ('dye') during the examination, to enhance the appearance of anatomy. You may receive an intravenous injection of a medicine to relax the muscles in your small bowel. This may cause blurring of vision in some patients and it recommended not to drive for one hour after this injection if affected.

As Beaumont is an acute hospital, there may be occasions when other patients may need to be scanned urgently which could mean you experience a delay to your appointed time. Please allow for 1 and a half in the MRI department on this basis. Please arrive **15 minutes** prior to your examination.

#### **During the Examination**

The MRI scanners in Beaumont Hospital have a wide circular bore and is open at both ends. The Radiographer will position you on the MRI table and try make you as comfortable as possible. You will be provided with earplugs and headphones to protect your ears, as it will be very noisy during the scan, like a tapping sound. A communication buzzer will also be placed in your hand, so you can alert the Radiographer at any point. The Radiographer will put a device over your abdomen, called a coil, to get good quality imaging.

The Radiographer will slowly move the MRI table into position. The body part being scanned will be placed at the centre of the scanner. The Radiographer performing the scan can see you throughout the scan. It is important that to try to stay as still as possible, to ensure good quality images. You may be required to following breathing instructions.

The scan can take from 20 minutes to 60 minutes, depending on the examination requested. Once your examination is complete, you are free to leave the department and continue with your day.

#### How do I receive the results of my scan?

The results of your MRI scan will not be available immediately. The results will be sent to the Doctor who referred you for the MRI scan.
